How Can Anyone Write an Unwritten Language?

Did you know over 1.5 billion (1,500,000,000) people today still do not have the whole Bible in their language?

Missionary linguists study unwritten languages. They listen carefully to strange new sounds and write them all down.

But how can anyone write an unwritten language? Here is how it works:

Linguists do not use the English alphabet. Instead, they write with the *International Phonetic Alphabet*. It has one symbol for every sound possible to human beings.

Here is John 3:16 in the ICB version: 'For God loved the world so much that he gave his only Son. God gave his Son so that whoever believes in him may not be lost but have eternal life.'

This is how the same verse looks in the International Phonetic Alphabet:

Now, what about the 'o' in Son? How is it different from the other three?

And finally, the 'o' in world, and in whoever.
