

Bringing our Wills into the will of the Lord Jesus

Please don't feel you need to leave Wycliffe a legacy in your Will. But if you are thinking of doing so, I'd love to share with you something of the sense of privilege I feel in leaving Wycliffe a legacy in my Will.

I leave to Wycliffe UK Ltd, CMS House, Watlington Road, Oxford OX4 6BZ, Charity Registration Number 251233, the sum of £ (amount in figures and words) for its general charitable purposes and I direct that the receipt of the Treasurer or other duly authorised officer shall be a sufficient discharge to my executors.

To leave a proportion (Residuary legacy)

I leave to Wycliffe UK Ltd, CMS House, Watlington Road, Oxford OX4 6BZ, Charity Registration Number 251233, (proportion of residue to be completed) for its general charitable purposes and I direct that the receipt of the Treasurer or other duly authorised officer shall be a sufficient discharge to my executors.
